Welcome to the Coalition for After School Funding
Advocacy Day! You're all here to be part of
CASF's campaign to increase state funds for after
school programs! My name is John Moore and I
am principal of the Franklin School in Hempstead,
on Long Island.

Okay, it looks to me that everyone is here! Now, we need to discuss why we are here. Today, we're all here to talk about three specific ways New York State funds after school programs:

21st Century Community Learning Centers
 Program

This is the most urgent reason we are here today!

The 21st century programs from cohort one that will lose funding as of June 30, 2007, serve 207 programs and if we don't save these programs, over 34,000 students will lose their after-school program! We must tell our Assemblymembers and Senators to save this program!

Advantage After School Programs
 Advantage provides grants to not-for-profit
 organizations coordinating with schools. Although

it received a small increase in the budget, you need to tell your legislators how much important this program is and that they need to give it more funding!

Extended Day

Extended Day funds academic tutoring and remediation, conflict resolution/violence prevention, recreational and other programs for 29,000 young people throughout the state. It was flat-funded in the budget bills – during your meetings, ask the Senate and Assembly to add more money to this important program!

All three provide money to the programs you attend. You learned about this in your training sessions, and we'll go over it a little in the role play this morning. Our after school programs need

these funds, or they won't be able to have all the activities you have now, and in some cases they might even have to close their doors. That's why we need to raise our voices and let the legislators here know that they have to fund our programs!

I thought we'd learn some chants now – we need to make sure everyone in Albany can hear us and knows that we support after-school programs!

John How many of you have been on a lobby visit before? Do you know what's going to happen today when you visit your Senator and Assemblymembers offices? Well, just to get us all a little prepared for what's going to happen, we have some skits to show you. You've learned and seen a lot during our program today – now it's time for you to go on your lobby visits and tell your elected officials what is most important!

And just because you leave Albany today, doesn't mean your job is done! We need you to write more letters and ask all of your elected officials –

at the local, state and federal level – to save afterschool!
